Mark 14:1 to Mark 15:47



*In his Apostolic Exhortation, <u>Laudete Deum</u>, Pope Francis gives an urgent call to tackle the climate crisis recognizing that time is running out. Irreversible damage has already been done. In this letter Pope Francis states that the climate crisis is real and cannot be denied. It is caused by human activity.

• Good Friday: Isaiah 52:13—53:12; Psalm 31:2, 6, 12-13, 15-17, 25; Hebrews 4:14-16; 5:7-9; John 18:1—19:42.

• Easter Vigil: Genesis 1:1—2:2 or 1:1, 26-31; Psalm 104:1 -2, 5-6, 10-14, 24, 35 or 33:4-7, 12-13, 20, 22; Genesis 22:1-18 or 22:1-2, 9-13, 15-18; Psalm 16:5, 8-11; Exodus 14:15—15:1; Exodus 15:1-6, 17-18; Isaiah 54:5-14; Psalm 30:2, 4-6, 11-13; Isaiah 55:1-11; (Psalm) Isaiah 12:2-6; Baruch 3:9-15, 32-4:4; Psalm 19:8-11; Ezekiel 36:16-28; Psalm 42:3, 5; 43:3, 4; Isaiah 12:2-3, 4-6 or Psalm 51:12-15, 18-19; Romans 6:3-11.

<u>Easter Sunday:</u> Acts 10:34, 37-43; Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6-8; John 20:1-9

The Church informs us we must fast and abstain from eating meat on Good Friday, March 29. The Church encourages us to maintain the fast and abstinence of Good Friday thru Holy Saturday until after the Easter Vigil. For those with health or age requirements that prevent fasting, another penance can be offered.

Christians around the world are united in a special way during Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. Our hearts, minds and prayers are also especially aware of the Holy Land. As a pontifical collection requested by Pope Francis, the annual <u>Good Friday Collection</u> offers a direct link for parishioners to be witnesses of peace and help by housing and feeding the poor, providing religious education, maintaining shrines and parishes, and conducting pastoral ministry. Holy Week is the most important time of the year, and the Sacred Triduum is the most important part of Holy Week. You are encouraged to make Holy Week a priority over all other events in your life. Think of it as an extended retreat, from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday, from the Cross to the Empty Tomb. Make it a priority to come to the services during this time. Whether or not you can come, make Holy Week "holy" by focusing on the events & their meaning.

March 23 & 24 — Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, Masses: Saturday at 4:30 pm and Sunday at 10:30 am Monday, March 25 — Chrism Mass at the Cathedral, 7 pm Thursday, March 28 — Holy Thursday (no morning Mass) Mass of the Lord's Supper, 7:00 pm Friday, March 29 —Good Friday (no Mass today) Passion of the Lord, 3:00 pm Saturday, March 30 — Holy Saturday (no 4:30 pm Mass) Easter Vigil, 8:30 pm Sunday, March 31 — Easter Sunday Mass, 10:30 am

You are invited to spend some time with Jesus in Adoration on Fridays after mass until4:00 pm. Adoration this week after Holy Thursday Mass. No adoration of the Blessed Sacrament this Friday, which is Good Friday. Starting the Friday after Easter adoration concludes at 4 pm.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church on Christ's Death. 604 By giving up his own Son for our sins, God manifests that his plan for us is one of benevolent love, prior to any merit on our part: "In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the expiation for our sins." God "shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us."

605 At the end of the parable of the lost sheep Jesus recalled that God's love excludes no one: "So it is not the will of your Father who is in heaven that one of these little ones should perish. "He affirms that he came "to give his life as a ransom for many"; this last term is not restrictive, but contrasts the whole of humanity with the unique person of the redeemer who hands himself over to save us. The Church, following the apostles, teaches that Christ died for all men without exception: "There is not, never has been, and never will be a single human being for whom Christ did not suffer."

(Scriptural references: 1 Jn 4:10, 4:19; Rom 5:8, 18-19; Mt 18:14, 20:28; 2 Cor 5:15 and 1 Jn 2:2)

Why do we wear red on Palm Sunday?

Red has a dual imagery: On one hand, red symbolizes the shedding of blood and is therefore used on Palm Sunday (when Christ entered Jerusalem to prepare for His death), Good Friday, any other commemoration of the Lord's passion, the votive Mass of the Precious Blood, the days marking the martyrdom of the apostles (except St. John), and the feasts of other martyrs who offered their lives for the faith. -Taken from EWTN.com
